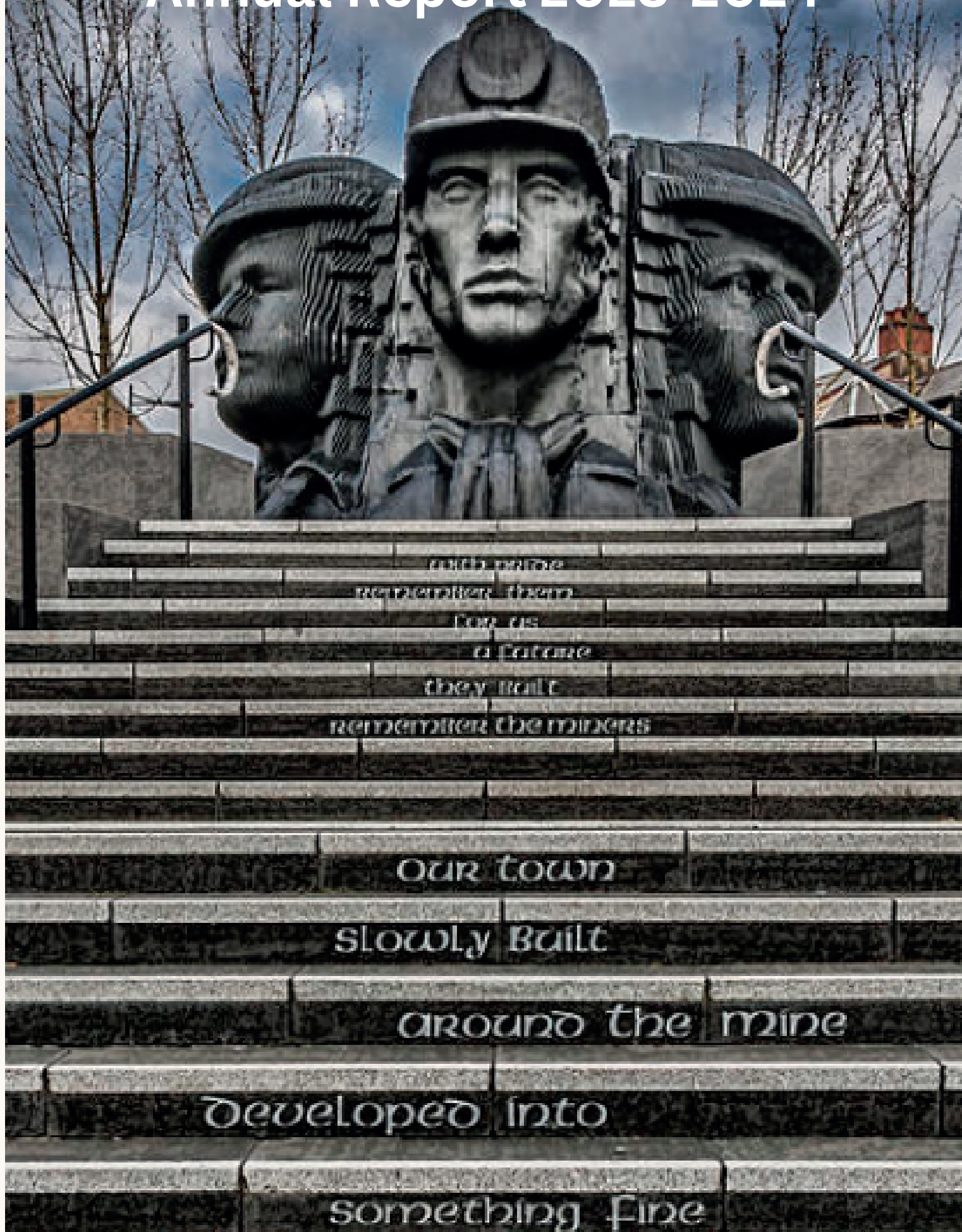

This FREE event was very well attended by 93 residents and included a raffle and refreshments.

We hope to build on our new events to bring people together, reducing loneliness and isolation.

COMMUNITY WELLBEING ACTIVITIES



Bargoed Town Council have made it a priority to promote wellbeing within our community. Over the past year Council has arranged, supported or delivered community activities such as:

Table-top Games & Pokemon: Once-a-month workshops delivered at Bargoed library by **Caerphilly CTG** throughout the year. A total of **353** children attended during 2023.

Easter Activities for young people: With the support of Caerphilly Youth Service, cooking, craft, sport and dance sessions were delivered from the Hangar in Aberbargoed. **In total, 78 young people attended.** A good time was reported to have been had by all.

Geocache: A treasure hunt with a difference, providing outdoor leisure activities while learning about the natural world and our local history. Working with Gwent Wildlife Trust, Gilfach Scouts and the Integrated Wellbeing Network we have two geocache trails running in our community now; One in Bargoed Urban Park and one in Bargoed Woodland Park. **420** site visits on the woodland park and **720** on the urban park far. **"Really fun geocache, who is very easy to find, moved a couple of sticks and logs found it straight away".**

Bird Boxes workshop: Town Council engaged the services of **Salvaged Creations CIC** to deliver workshops in Bargoed library where 28 residents attended.



COMMUNITY WELLBEING ACTIVITIES

Two sessions of beginners **guitar playing workshops** were delivered by **RecRoc** at Bargoed each week for 6 weeks in February and March 2024. All twelve sessions were fully booked!

Welcoming Spaces were expanded by town council to include Art & Craft sessions for adults. Over 70 people attended the additional sessions delivered by Platform at Gilfach Bargoed Community Centre, and Cartref Community Hall expanded their provision attracting new residents to their craft sessions.

Members continued the expansion of **Community Gardening opportunities** through installation of 20 new raised beds at parks, church premises, primary schools, community venues and the Big Box Bite Project. Fruit bushes and vegetables were planted and the community orchard expanded with additional fruit trees. Food Growing areas are popping up in all areas of the community through the support of young people at Caerphilly Youth Service and volunteers in the community.

Christmas Selection Boxes were delivered for all 1158 children in the six primary schools and the home schooled primary students.

Bug Barn Making Workshops were arranged at Bargoed library where 28 residents learned new woodworking skills and learned all about the importance of insects for biodiversity.



COMMUNITY WELLBEING ACTIVITIES

Our skilful residents developed lovely **craftwork floral displays** to brighten up some of the community railings throughout the Bargoed in Bloom period last year. From colourful knitted post box toppers to crochet flowers and large petal displays, the community came together as one to lift the spirits of local residents and celebrate all things floral.

Bargoed in Bloom feedback included: **“Well done to everyone that took part, nice to see our little town of Bargoed making a fabulous community effort”** and **“Congratulations to all the winners and all the shops and businesses for brightening the town.”**

Members once again continued the expansion of the **Community Floral Displays** bringing in additional floral fountains and beehives, new barrier baskets and half barrels. The biodiversity working group planted wildflower seeds in the heart of Bargoed around the miners heads statue and feedback from primary school children about the bees they watched when walking home from school was quite something. **“They look absolutely stunning, thank you Bargoed Town Council. “So beautiful”. “They look very nice too”.**

Summer Sports Scheme: Town Council extended provision of the scheme this year with **Caerphilly Sports Development Team** and the **Skateboard Academy** providing sporting activities for the six weeks school holidays at Heolddu in Bargoed and four weeks from the Hangar in Aberbargoed.

Throughout the six weeks provision **at Heolddu 792 children took part**, with a further **254 children participating** during the two weeks **at the Hangar in Aberbargoed.**

COUNCIL MEETINGS

Council meets monthly on a Wednesday except August when council is in recess.

Meetings commence promptly at 6pm.

A full list of monthly meeting dates can be found on the town council website.

Meetings take place on a hybrid basis using the Microsoft Teams platform and the Town Hall in the Courthouse building adjacent to Bargoed Police station.

Members of the public are entitled to attend most meetings of council.

If you would like to attend a meeting, you should contact the Clerk or Deputy Clerk to discuss options or to obtain a meeting link and agenda.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Audit

Section 12 of the Public Audit (Wales) Act 2004 requires community and town councils in Wales to make up their accounts each year to 31 March and to have those accounts audited by the Auditor General for Wales.

Regulation 14 of the Accounts and Audit (Wales) Regulations 2014 states that smaller local government bodies i.e., those with annual income and expenditure below £2.5 million must prepare their accounts in accordance with proper practices.

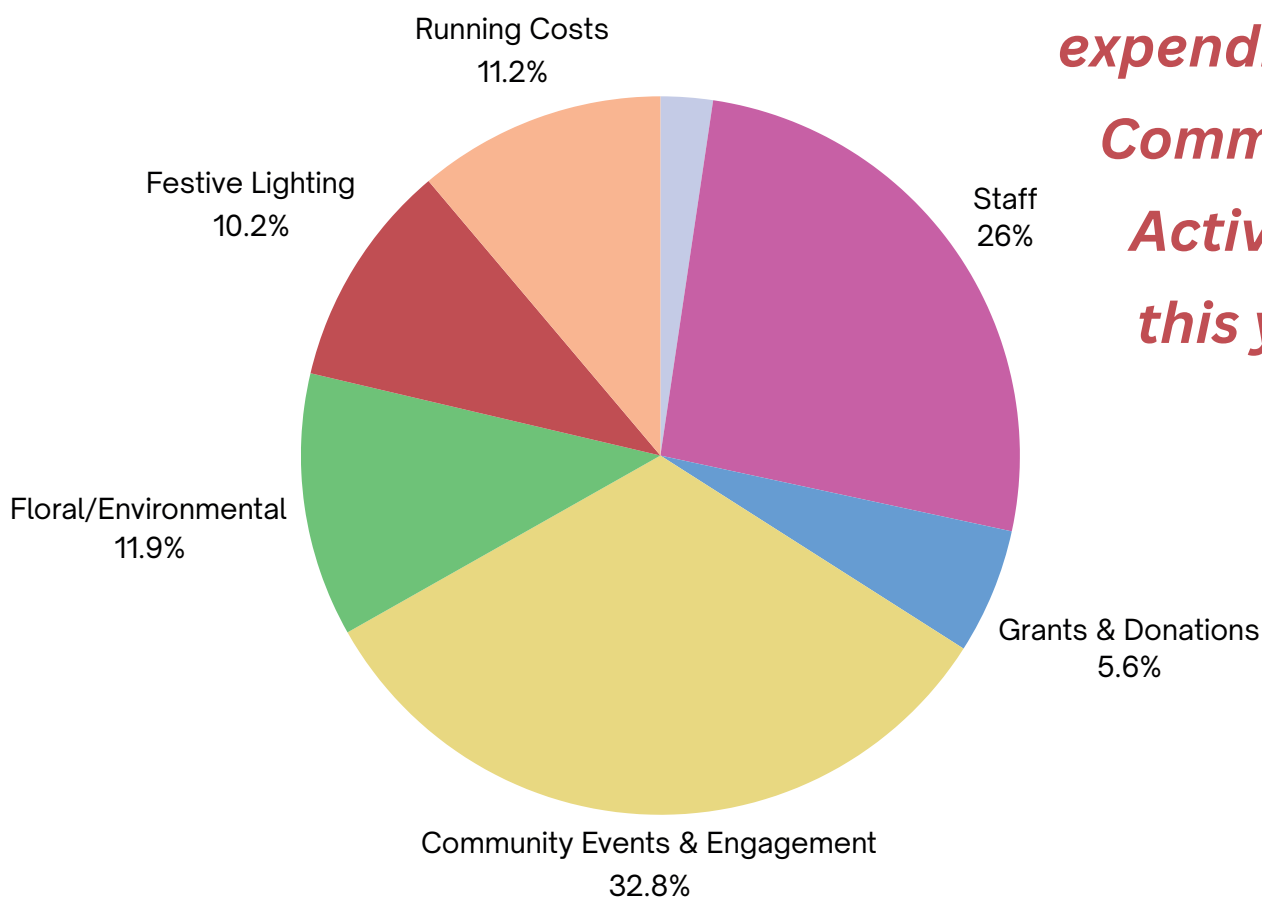
FINANCIAL INFORMATION

As at 31st March 2024

Town and Community Councils' primary means of income is through the 'precept.' This is the proportion of annual council tax that is paid by the electorate towards supporting the local councils' sector. In addition to the precept, councils may have income from investments, fees for services, grants and donations, refund of VAT payments from HMRC.

For the 2023-2024 financial year, the precept was £ 171,746.00

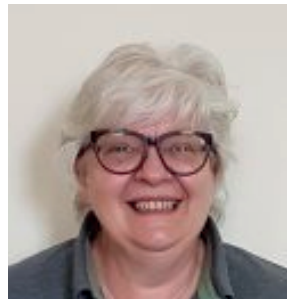

INDEPENDENT REMUNERATION PANEL

Local Government (Wales) Measure 2011 introduced payment of allowances to Councillors, and they are now determined by the Independent Remuneration Panel for Wales. Some allowances must apply to all members, however individual members can decline part, or all, of their entitlement. The council is required to publish details of all payments made to each Councillor.

What are the Allowances?

Mandatory Payments

- Extra Costs Payment - All councils must pay their members £156 a year (equivalent to £3 a week) towards the extra household expenses of working from home.
- Councils must either pay their members £52 a year for the cost of office consumables required to carry out their role, or alternatively councils must enable members to claim full reimbursement for the cost of their office consumables.
- Costs of care of personal assistance

Optional Payments

- Mayor or Chair's Allowance - up to £1,500 maximum
- Deputy Mayor or deputy chair - Up to £500 maximum
- Attendance Allowance
- Financial loss
- Travel and Subsistence

The panel “strongly believe that councillors should be reimbursed for expenses they necessarily incur whilst carrying out their duties or receive a contribution to help defray these costs”.

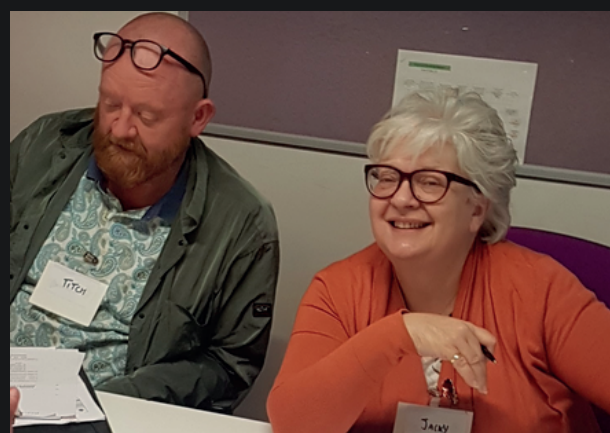

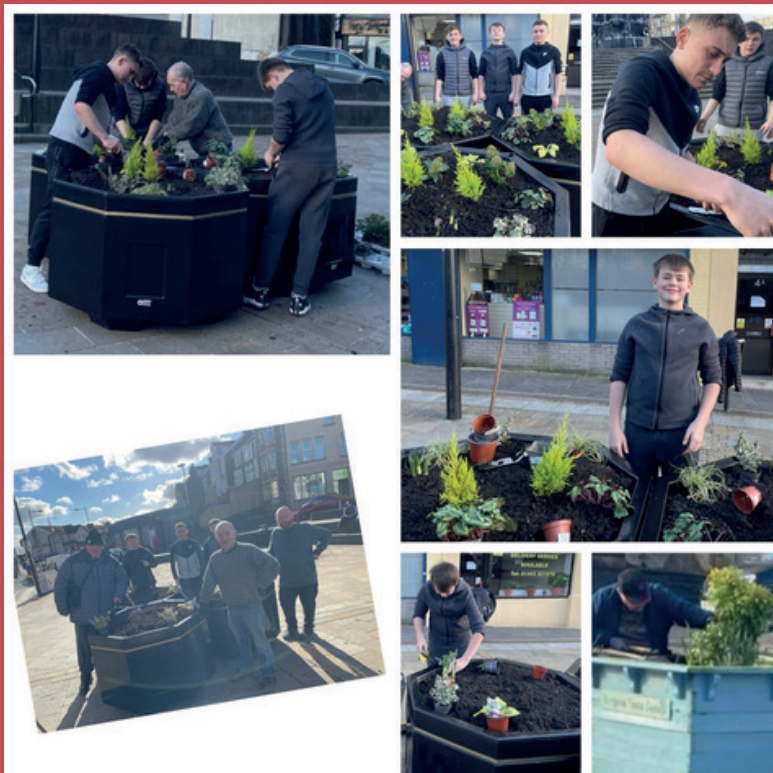
Committee Reports

P&R members focus on effective use of public money for maximum community benefit, improving governance & reporting. We have looked at opportunities to work closer with our businesses and develop initiatives to increase footfall in the town.

The CEC held four sessions, one each at Bargoed, Gilfach and Park wards and one with young people at Heolddu school. Youth Rep opportunities have been advertised and Members have plans for several additional engagement activities including suggestion boxes, a questionnaire survey.

Ever Thought of Being a Councillor?

To be a local councillor, you must be at least 18 years old and a qualifying commonwealth citizen, a citizen of the Republic of Ireland, a relevant citizen of the Union or a qualifying foreign citizen. You also need to meet at least one of the following four qualifications:

Are, and will continue to be, registered as a local government elector for the community in which they wish to stand;

Have owned or occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the community area for the whole of the 12 months before the day of their nomination and the day of the election;

Main or only place of work during the 12 months before the day of their nomination and the day of election has been in the community area;

Have lived in the community area or within three miles of it for the whole of the 12 months before the day of their nomination and the day of election.

A – Being Elected – at a normal election which takes place every five years or at a by-election in the event of 10 or more members of the electorate requesting one when a casual vacancy arises.

B – Being Co-opted - Co-option is what happens in the event there are not enough candidates at election time, and the Council chooses who will fill the vacant seat on the Council.

Town Council is a non-political corporate body. Whichever route you take to becoming a councillor, once you formally accept the office, it makes no difference; you are councillors working together to serve your community. Your task is to bring local issues to the attention of the council, and help it make decisions on behalf of the local community.

WHO DOES WHAT?

Caerphilly County Borough Council or Bargoed Town Council?

Knowing which local government organisation to contact can often be quite difficult. Bargoed Town Council is the first tier of local government. Caerphilly County Borough Council (CCBC) is the principal authority which is a tier above. While Bargoed Town Council is not able to directly deal with the following issues, Members are more than happy to liaise with relevant departments at CCBC on behalf of our community:
